Feb 21, 2014 (Winnipeg, MB): Today, the Manitoba Institute for Patient Safety officially announced that it will host *Growing The Legacy*, a public educational event on Monday, May 26, 2014 to recognize MIPS' 10 years of service to Manitobans in the field of patient safety.

The independent, non-profit organization was created in 2004 by the provincial government to co-ordinate and promote activities that enhance patient safety.

The two-hour event will begin at 1:00 p.m. It will feature three well-known and respected leaders in their fields: The Honourable Justice Murray Sinclair, CBC Radio's Terry MacLeod, and Hugh MacLeod, the CEO of the Canadian Patient Safety Institute. The public will have the opportunity to ask questions and make comments

The Honourable Justice Murray Sinclair will provide his account of conducting the Pediatric Cardiac Surgery Inquest, studying the deaths of twelve children in the pediatric cardiac surgery program of Winnipeg's Health Sciences Centre in 1994. Twenty years later, the topic and loss of lives remains highly significant in the current environment of provincial inquests in healthcare and beyond.

"The Manitoba Institute for Patient Safety is delighted to have Justice Sinclair as our lead speaker," said Jan Currie, MIPS' board chair. "Justice Sinclair's findings would ultimately lead, in part, to the creation of our Institute to coordinate educational and other initiatives aimed at improving patient safety."

CBC Radio's Terry MacLeod will share his personal experiences and those of many people who have called in over the years to share their healthcare experiences during his award-winning radio talk shows.

Terry has quipped that he is 'a frequent flyer in Canada's healthcare system', having experienced exposures to emergency rooms and clinics in at least three provinces outside of Manitoba. He severely broke his leg eight years ago. He had quintuple bypass surgery in 2012. Last year he had his gall bladder removed and, as a result, this year he continues to fight a serious infection he picked up during his last hospital stay.
